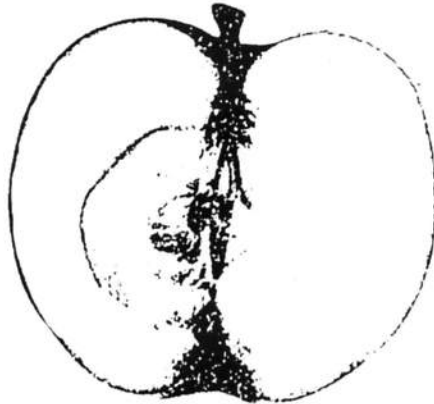
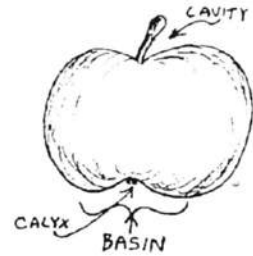

CHERRYFIELD (OR COLLINS) APPLE

LAST SEEN DOWNEAST !

DESCRIPTION :

A chance seedling on the farm of the late Wyman B. Collins, Cheryfield [Washington county] Me., about 50 years ago.[1850] Original tree still standing. [1907]

Tree vigorous, hardy, spreading and productive.

Fruit large, roundish conical, yellowish green, washed and splashed on the sunny side with crimson. Stem medium, stout, inserted in a moderately deep, flaring, regular cavity; basin small, irregular; calyx closed; flesh greenish white, crisp, tender, fine grained, mild, acid. Good. Season November to February.

Mr. David W. Campbell of Cherryfield, Me., who sends this apple, writes that it has been extensively grafted to all kinds of apple trees in the vicinity of Cherryfield, and that it proves hardy n that locality. Under ordinary conditions it keeps through January, and has kept in good condition until April. The variety is known locally as Collins, because of its original home. This name, however, is already in use for a variety originating in Arkansas, hence the change indicated. Promising.
